“ *I first met Fred back in 1997 as we both worked in Saudi Arabia together. As the years went by, even though we worked on different platforms, we always managed to keep in touch. When Fred arrived in India in 2012, I was working in the UAE. When I came to work, I would see Fred on-line and so I would Instant Message (IM) him. Often, I would reach out to Fred for technical assistance but more often than not, we would just exchange some witty banter back and forth. We did this for 4 years until he retired in 2016. While in India Fred often griped about working with the Thug Monkeys and the snakes. I could not honestly tell if he was referring to the wild habitat or Boeing Management. (I think it was the latter). When Fred mentioned he had a tiger roaming around the warehouse I suggested that he list Zookeeper on his resume. When Fred complained about his cramped pre-fab office, I would try to one up him and exclaim “what you have an office, as I work out of a cardboard box!”. When he stated he was on a low carb Chicken and Veggie diet, I told him I was surviving only on twigs and rocks. I would always ask Fred what he was up to, and his typical response was “Just causing trouble” and so I always thought “Trouble” was his middle name. I once asked Fred why he was not on Facebook, and he said to many people were looking for him. Not sure what he meant by that but as often as Fred switched jobs (Loyal to none, sworn to fun), I was sure he was on the witness protection program. I will miss Fred’s quick wit and his dark sense of humor. We briefly spoke on the phone on 10 June, and we shared one more laugh together before he earned his wings on 15 June. I will treasure the IMs, the e-mails, the telephone conversations and the numerous laughs we shared together. I was proud to call Fred my friend.*

He was looking for local military people to work on the program, so it was serendipitous that our paths crossed. I look back at those days with great fondness because he was so instrumental in helping set my feet on a post Air Force path that has been nothing but rewarding. I owe him a great deal.

On a more personal note, I'm not sure that I've ever met a more generous soul with such an amazing capacity to just take whatever life threw his way. A philosopher with a dry sense of humor that was as contagious as it was, sometimes, unexpected. When I would ask how he could remain so calm when I thought he should be upset about something, he would just smirk and say that he would never give someone the power to make him angry. I choose to think of him as just off on yet another of his adventures, and, as sure as I sit here today struggling for the right words to illustrate how much this man has touched my life, I know that one day our paths will cross again. When that time comes, I know we will fall right back into that comfortable friendship that I've been so fortunate to share with him. We'll have a lot of catching up to do.
